

FROM THE VICAR

You know you're beginning to really settle into a job when you've done the whole cycle of work and started again. It's been a very strange year and a bit; when we arrived in September 2020, the churches had been closed since the beginning of lockdown and the challenge was to find a safe way to get them open, only to have to close again in December. We have got very proficient at all sorts of new technology, especially Zoom, which we have been using for services both while we were closed and since. We are now open again and have been having weekly services since October, while continuing to be online fortnightly on Zoom for all those who can't be with us in church. It's been a challenge to work out how to reach people and include folk, but it's also been a chance to think about what we mean by church, how we use our beautiful but ancient buildings, and what might be the future for our community.

When we talk about church we tend to think about those buildings, but when the first Christians met and worshipped together 'the church' was the group of people who gathered, sometimes in people's homes, sometimes in the temple. The church was the people, not the building. But we have had churches in our Benefice for 1000 years, and people have met and prayed in them for so long that it is almost like the gap between heaven and earth is worn thin by those prayers. Inside the stone walls, the peace that comes from God fills the space. No wonder it has been hard in the months that the churches have been locked up. Though our heads tell us that this has been necessary to keep us safe, our hearts have been saddened.

It's not just been new technology that has filled the gap, we've used the outside space over the last year to meet, worship and to pray. Last Easter we shared the story of Jesus' death and resurrection with the children of St John the Baptist and St Andrew's schools through 'Experience Easter Outside'. We had stations telling the story, with some amateur dramatics from the church family, and we left storyboards around the churchyard so that other visitors could explore the story of God's salvation plan for the world. We had outdoor church monthly over the summer in the grounds of St Andrew's School, and at Christmas we had 'Outdoor Carols' in the garden of The Red Lion pub. As COVID numbers were rising exponentially just before Christmas, our Crib Services were replaced by 'The Christmas Journey', a walking Nativity from St Margarets Station to the stable at St Andrew's church. We travelled like Mary and Joseph, knocking at the inns to see if there was any room, singing Carols all the way!

There's an old saying with a lot of truth in it, that when we pray to God for patience, he gives us opportunities to be patient; when we pray to God for strength, he gives us opportunities to be strong. We have had a lot of opportunities to grow in our patience, strength, resilience, imagination and courage! And I hope we have learned to be hopeful, to look for the blessings we have, to appreciate the relationships that make us a community, and to love and care for our neighbours.

THE THREE CHURCHES FOODBANK HUB



A local Hub of the Hertford & Ware Foodbank based at St Margarets' Parish Church

The local Foodbank Hub operating out of St Margarets' Parish Church (St Mary the Virgin) began life in December 2020, after discussions with our Priest in Charge, Reverend Sarah Forrest. Through her links with the schools, the increasing strain on individuals and families during the Pandemic became apparent, and the idea of a local hub delivering to people in the villages was taken up by us as a church. We regularly deliver Foodbank parcels to people in need, many of whom would struggle to get to Hertford or Ware to pick up what they and their families need.

We began applying for various grants to help us in our plans, and were blessed with positive responses from sources such as East Herts County Council and CVSBEH. When the Rectory took on a new lease of life during the early part of 2021 as Temporary Accommodation for single guys and families, we felt that it would be an appropriate gesture to give a 'Welcome' pack of groceries for each and every new arrival. We were aware that moving to a new area and maybe not knowing anyone or where the local shops were, it would be comforting for the new residents to feel that we were thinking of them and welcoming them into one of our villages. A small gesture such as this was also a way of new arrivals knowing that there were people out there that they could contact if they needed any additional assistance.

We also advertised on Facebook for bedding, towels etc. early on in the life of the Rectory and the response was absolutely amazing; we only advertised for a couple of days and were inundated with so much that we were able to take down our request very quickly. We would like to take the opportunity of thanking everyone who responded to our cry for help. The response was overwhelming and humbling. It is at times like this, that our villages really show true community spirit.

We now also have links with a local charity working to reduce food waste, and we collect food items from supermarkets, which we deliver to local people on a weekly basis.

This is just the beginning and even though we have been in lockdown on and off since our launch, and have had to do less than we would have liked, it is a fantastic beginning. We are forming links with various charities and have plans for more work to support local people in the coming months.

ST MARGARETS STATION ART



St Margarets Station Art project leads

At French & Jupps we strive to support our community through the sponsorship of innovative ideas, partnering with community lead initiatives that make our local and surrounding area so vibrant.

In acknowledgement of the hard work of all those involved with our latest sponsorship it brings us great delight to announce the unveiling of the refurbishment of St Margarets train station in Stanstead Abbotts.

The refurbishment of St Margarets station and signal box was a concept driven by The New River Line Community Rail Partnership. The Community Rail Partnership (CRP) was formally established in January 2020 by local authorities, community groups and organisations working in partnership with Greater Anglia and other rail networks to enhance station platforms up and down the country.

At the centre of this initiative for our local area is Katie Goldthorpe, CRP Officer for the New River Line, which covers all stations from Hertford East to Broxbourne. Katie

not only works for the organization, but also lives in Stanstead Abbotts and had long thought that the signal box could be transformed at St Margarets. It was when she joined the CRP in 2020, she seized the opportunity to do something with it.

To commence the process, Katie contacted French & Jupps to propose sponsoring the redesign of the station platform with art, which was enthusiastically received by director Paul King. From there the campaign was launched on the Stanstead Abbotts community Facebook page in addition to posters being pinned up on village noticeboards requesting submissions from people within the area to submit original artworks the redesign.

The response was fantastic, with local residents and two local primary schools St John the Baptist and St Andrew's Primary School getting involved. The result is stunning with the twelve art pieces in a variety of mediums being chosen and printed by local company Universal Signs.

Katie's work doesn't end there. She had also been working with Rosemary & Robin to bring new life to the station through a planting scheme introducing foliage onto the station platform. The tireless work of all involved culminated in the annual station adoption award being granted at the unveiling by Alan Neville, Community Engagement Manager, Greater Anglia.

Overall, the day was a great success, enhanced further by the generous offering of cakes and refreshments provided by local businesses Libby's Coffee Shop and The Galley Hall pub in a true reflection of community spirit.

We believe the results are spectacular and that the return to travel from our local station is made all the brighter as a result of their hard work.

St Margarets Parish Council

We have been busy choosing projects that not only benefit the community, but also the environment. With the help of the Woodland Trust, we planted 420 saplings on land provided by Councillor Nigel Copping. In addition to this work, we arranged for the Granary footpath under the A414 flyover by the railway line and into St Margarets Community Wood to be cleared and reopened. The area has been a focal point for antisocial activities, and we were keen to reclaim the space for local residents.

Currently our ongoing projects are:

- * To extend the CCTV programme within the village for St Margarets towards Hoddesdon Road.
- * Installation of a new defibrillator at the Nigel Copping Centre.
- * Adopting a High Street bench to repair and restore it.
- * Working with LVRP (Lea Valley) to improve the green area by The Jolly Fisherman.
- * Working with all Parishes to complete the Neighbourhood Plan.
- * Investigating the option of funding our own PSCO.
- * Consideration for a Tommy Statue within the St Margarets Parish.
- * Search for new volunteers to join the Parish Council committee.

Stanstead Abbotts Parish Council

We hope that villagers enjoyed the Christmas lights in the High Street. The lights cost around £7000 pounds a year and the council is currently considering quotes for next year's lights. Stanstead Abbotts Parish Council have been busy setting the budget for the coming financial year 2022–23. In addition to funds from Council Tax, the Parish Council has secured funds in the last few years by way of grants which have enabled a new outdoor gym area, new toddler play equipment, the new CCTV system, and several new tables in the Meadow and playground two of which have wheelchair access. These improvements would not have been possible without funding, and we are hoping to secure more funding this year for further enhancements to the village and its facilities, and would welcome any suggestions from residents on what they feel would enhance our lovely village. INTRODUCTION TO ST MARGARETSBURY FOOTBALL CLUB

The club was founded in 1894 as Stanstead Abbotts FC, but in 1962 the club moved to their present location, St Margaretsbury Recreation Ground in St Margarets - on condition they changed their name to St Margaretsbury FC.

On the left is the earliest photo we have, which is of the 1896/97 team at their home ground in Mill Field, Cappell Lane in Stanstead Abbotts. Given photography was not commonplace for working class people, we are humbled and grateful to have such a precious example of the club's heritage.

However, we have always looked to be forward-thinking, especially in embracing new technology, and we were one of the first clubs in the UK to move to a digitally published programme during our 2017/18 league season. Programme Collectors prefer a printed version, but the digital version allows us to include links and even video. Next season we will have the latest Al Sports Camera available, which will allow us to live stream matches over the internet, and our Coaches can access footage to use as an analytical tool to

improve their individual and team performances - exciting times!

The club is run entirely by volunteers, some of whom live within Stanstead Abbotts and others further afield. We are always keen to welcome new local volunteers, so please read on, and let us know if you would be interested to join, or just come down and have a chat.

We are essentially a Village Club, but our Senior First team has performed at a consistent level in the Premier Division for the

last 23 years – against Clubs such as Hoddesdon Town. But we also have 8 youth teams from Under 11s to Under 17s (122 players), an Under 18s team and a Ladies Team.

The senior team is the flagship of the club and they play in the Essex Senior League on Saturdays and sometimes Tuesday evening on our floodlit stadium pitch. This is the only team where we charge an entrance fee to watch - $\pounds 7$ Adult, $\pounds 5$ Concession for Senior Citizens 65 or over – but all children under 14 years of age can enter and watch for FREE.

We publish all the Senior, U18 and Ladies fixtures in our digital programme, which also has links to each of the leagues for full fixtures and results.

The facilities include plenty of FREE parking on-site, a warm and friendly Clubhouse Bar with Tina our Bar Steward serving hot & cold drinks, a great outlook across the Cricket Field and grounds, with the Tennis courts to the side.

STANSTEAD ABBOTTS LOCAL HISTORY SOCIETY (SALHS)



Stanstead Abbotts High Street in the 1920s

It was on a February evening in 2012 that the formation of a local history society for the villages of Stanstead Abbotts and St Margarets was mooted. The driving force behind it was the charismatic Ian White. By May, a Constitution had been agreed and the first public meeting took place.

Now, nine years on, the Society is the largest, regular, social gathering in the village. Membership is over 100; a book has been published and an average of 60 attended our monthly meetings prior to lockdown.

But from the outset Ian White made it a principle that SALHS was not just about past village history. He was adamant that such a society should be involved in the villages' unfolding history.

So we've engaged in a wide range of contemporary activities. Have you seen, for example, the Information Board at the entrance to the car park? Or read the plaques at the entrances to the village streets commemorating the soldiers from those roads who died in the First World War? Or the War Memorial in the church grounds that was cleaned and shined up for the centenary remembrances in 2014? Or perhaps you attended the beacons lit on Easneye Ridge in 2018 to mark 100 years since the war ended? Or maybe you've sat on one of the donated benches scattered around the village, which we've checked and maintained? Most recently our members have been involved in the paintings that have gone up on the old railway signal box. These are just some of the projects that SALHS has been involved with since 2012.

But, to my mind, the greatest contribution SALHS has made is the production and organising of its website (www.salhs.org.uk). Have you visited it yet? You must do! It's a 'treasure store' of the villages' heritage. Articles range from the beginnings of a primitive Lea-side community to an account of the largest employer the village has known, Websters of Netherfield Lane. There are personal reminiscences, accounts of local Second World War plane crashes and tales of the New River – not to mention the great malting industry that continues to this day. So much to wonder at and enjoy.

We were, of course, so sad that because of COVID-19 we could not meet physically at our monthly gatherings. With an average of over 60 in attendance this was such a lively social occasion as well as being engagingly informative.

But we are now back to meeting together! Please accept this as an invitation to our next meeting. Members come free (membership is only £8.00 per year) while non-members pay £2.00. Maybe we'll see you there? Details of obtaining membership are on the website.

RECIPE: EASY BANANA OATCAKE BARS

Here is a really simple and easy recipe to make delicious banana oatcake bars. A great treat to make with the kids!

INGREDIENTS

3 ripe bananas, mashed 40g margarine/softened butter 160g rolled/porridge oats 80g dried fruit/chocolate chips 1 tsp vanilla extract

METHOD

- 1. Mix all the ingredients together in a large bowl.
- 2. Press the mix into a greased shallow baking tin.
- 3. Bake in a pre-heated oven at 180° C for 15-20 minutes until golden brown.
- 4. Leave to cool on a cooling rack.
- 5. Once cool, gently remove from the tin and cut into bars/squares (any size you like).
- 6. Store in an air-tight container and they will stay fresh for 2-3 days.

UPDATES FROM OUR LOCAL SCHOOLS

We are lucky to have a number of excellent schools within the three villages. We would like to take this opportunity to thank all the wonderful staff at the schools for their hard work and dedication, especially over what has been a highly unusual and challenging few years.



Amwell View School and Specialist Sports College

Hidden away behind a small wooded area that we call 'The Dell' is our school for children with Severe Learning Difficulties. We are a maintained Local Authority School in Hertfordshire, based in Stanstead Abbotts.

Built in 1963, the school now provides specialist education to children aged 2–19 years, from highly qualified staff to 154 children who are lucky enough to be given a place. There is a bit of a crisis in special education – in that there are too few schools and too many pupils who need our expertise – hence my reference to children 'being lucky'.

The school is proud to tell you that we have achieved a judgement of 'Outstanding' from Ofsted four times and that this is down to the wonderful staff and the lovely children. The children always try hard to achieve their targets and, thanks to the work in partnership with parents, we are proud to tell you that the children make very good progress. The curriculum supports the children to achieve to the best of their ability. For some this may mean being able to walk. For others it may mean being able to speak, read and write. The celebrations are varied and numerous: learning to swimming, cleaning their own teeth, singing in the school choir, signing hello as they enter the classroom, sharing a smile and running in the races on Sports Day, are to name but a few.

It's so exciting to be a child at Amwell View School. The day is full of interesting and imaginative activities. Music and Sport are particularly popular, which means that our assemblies are good fun and the annual school show makes for great entertainment and draws an audience for 4 performances in 'Show Week'. Sports Day has been described by parents as the 'best day of the year' to be a spectator, when parents cheer their child on, chat with other family members and spend time outside with like-minded parents. Cheering and tears of joy make a great combination for a celebration.

Working together with parents is so fulfilling. Whatever might be the focus it's good to have some joined-up thinking so that we get to the same end point together and hopefully at the same time. The Speech and Language therapists, physiotherapist and Occupational Therapist along with school nurses and the Paediatrician make up a very complementary team of professionals, who provide a range of Health funded support to the children and their families.

EASTER FOCUS

Hot Cross Buns

As I sit here in the aftermath of the Christmas celebrations of the birth of Jesus Christ, I am reminded that however miraculous this event is, as is the miracle of birth of any new child, there's more to this than a baby arriving. I am reminded that this particular birth is so important because of Jesus' life, ministry, passion, death on the cross and resurrection. As a Christian, Maundy Thursday, when Jesus celebrated the Last Supper and later was accused, persecuted and handed to Pontius Pilate; Good Friday when Jesus was crucified; and Easter Sunday with Jesus' resurrection, mean so much more to me.

Within my family we have kept the simple tradition of making 'Hot Cross Buns' that started back in the 19th Century, and the recipe used each year is taken from my Great Grandmother's now extremely frail book. Each generation has been shown by the previous generation, or in my case two generations, Grandad and Dad, measuring the ingredients out diligently, including the Mixed Spice, only for Grandad to then put the rest of the packet in for extra flavour. Indeed, each year I now follow the same course, measuring the Mixed Spice carefully, before putting the rest in too! In a way it brings back my Grandad, Dad and all the previous generations in the process. Shop bought Hot Cross Buns have a lovely white cross in the middle; ours are made simply with a ruler pushed into the dough twice. Then when the buns come piping hot out of the oven, they are glazed by egg, milk and sugar, glazing the cross in particular.

To my knowledge the family have only missed making our Hot Cross Buns one year in 1917. My Grandad's brother Cecil was the first of the 'Atkins boys' to be sent to the Western Front in 1916. He was wounded in the head on Easter Monday 9th April 1917 in the Battle of Aras and died of wounds four days later. He was 19 when he died. Since then, the family has always ensured their Hot Cross Buns have been made and for many, many years it's been the men of the family who have been the custodians of this tradition.

Easter 2019 was my Dad's last Easter and I can remember him sitting in an armchair directing operations, helping me explain and tell the tales to his then 10 and 3 year old Granddaughters: the finer points of mixing in the breadcrumbs, measuring exactly and then making as many buns as possible from the mixture, how we have never broken his Dad's record of 88 buns. We then made the crosses, let the buns prove, bake and then glazed the multitude of buns as they came out of the oven. Then one bun was buttered for tasting. After that no more were eaten until breakfast on Good Friday, coffee time, lunch etc. with any family, friends or guests being offered them. When I was born just before Easter, my Grandad took several into hospital for Mum so she didn't miss out!!

Hot Cross Buns mean to me the great sacrifice Jesus made for all on the Cross, and the feeling of all the generations that have gone before being with me in those same prayers and traditions. That will, I hope, continue for generations to come.

THE NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN AND REGULATION 14



After several years' work of thoroughly exploring the settlement area, researching and discussing the options for the future of the village, we plan to go ahead with the necessary Regulation 14 consultation this spring. There has been a delay as we have been waiting for the responses to the AECOM organised Strategic Environmental Assessment (SEA). The SEA is a particular survey which has to be done where the Neighbourhood Plan Designated Area includes an internationally and nationally designated Ramsar site (wetlands with special recognition for their species and wildlife habitats) or Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI) as ours does.

All residents of Stanstead Abbotts Parish, St Margarets Parish and the section of Great Amwell Parish which is in the Designated Area for the Neighbourhood Plan, will be invited to look at and comment on the Neighbourhood Plan. A summary of the plan will be delivered with instructions about how to view the full document and how to respond should you wish to. The entire plan will be online and available for people to read, and we will be hoping to have online feedback or alternatively written feedback through the post. Comments have to be considered by the Steering Group and, if it is appropriate at the end of the consultation, changes will be made. There will be an Open Day when people can view paper copies of the Neighbourhood Plan and supporting documents, and ask how to complete their consultation response.

What the Neighbourhood Plan can NOT do is include any policy which would go against the current East Herts District Plan. Similarly we do not duplicate any policy already in that document, so it is well worth looking at the two documents together.

The plan will contain policies on green spaces and the natural environment; on the community and leisure; on heritage and protection for the many much-loved historical features in the community; there will be policies to encourage employment and others on transport addressing the needs of residents who have a variety of reasons to travel.

After the Regulation 14 consultation has closed, the responses taken into account and amendments made, it will be submitted to East Herts Council along with the Consultation Statement and statutory maps etc.

East Herts Council will publish the documents online for a further consultation – Regulation 16. The Plan and the consultation comments will then be inspected by an independent examiner and further changes are likely to be made. If it is considered to meet the Basic Conditions, a referendum will follow. All those people living in the Neighbourhood Plan Area will then have a chance to vote yes or no, i.e. in favour or not in favour. If more than 50% of the votes cast are in favour then the plan will be adopted by East Herts Council.

If the plan is adopted then no housing development outside the village boundary, other than on sites selected in the plan, will be granted planning permission by East Herts Council until 2033. This is why the Neighbourhood Plan is so vital to the future of our village.

The East Herts Community Benefit Lottery is a weekly online lottery. All funds raised go to good causes that benefit the local community in East Herts. The draw takes place every Saturday night at 8pm.

Each ticket costs £1 per week and consists of six numbers. The more numbers you match in a draw the bigger the prize you win! There is a 50:1 chance to win prizes up to the £25,000 jackpot.

Players choose who their ticket purchase will support. They can either support the Community Fund (funds are distributed to the local community) or they can choose a specific good cause to support.

There are a range of payment options. Players can play monthly via Direct Debit or credit/debit card so they never miss a draw. They can also make a one-off payment via Debit Card for 1, 3, 6 or 12 months.

Players are notified by email when they win. To claim their winnings, they log in to the lottery site and choose to either have the winnings paid directly into their nominated account or donate their winnings back to the good cause they support.

60% from every ticket sold goes directly to local good causes!

Good causes receive 50p from every ticket purchased via their lottery page. A further 10p is distributed to other local good causes via the central fund. 20p goes towards the prizes which can be won by supporters every week and 20p covers the cost of running the lottery and VAT.

How can your good cause join?

Applying is easy - it's all done online and takes a few minutes. East Herts Council lottery team will check each cause qualifies with the 'cause conditions' and approve them. A full list of criteria can be found on the website.

Once you're approved the sky is the limit - you can go and sell as many tickets as you wish to start raising unlimited funds for your cause! We provide all of the marketing materials you need to spread the word to your community via Facebook, Twitter or leaflets, plus there are additional special offers throughout the year. All you need to do is shout about the lottery to your supporters.
