


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FROM THE VICAR

Living in a box, living in a cardboard box...



Have you ever seen a square tomato? I remember seeing a TV programme where they talked about arowing square fruit. As the individual fruit grows you put it in a box. As it continues growing it fills the space and takes up the shape of the box it sits in, so you can get square tomatoes and square melons that are easier to put in the fridge and stack nicely.

As we head into and take up this new season of life, this season where we are 'living with COVID', at times I feel a bit like a square tomato. It's like we've been living in the box of COVID, with all the restrictions, for so long that we've almost forgotten what it's like to be without it. It's like we've got so used to living in a box, used to

having our knees up under our chin, tucked in tight and not able to get out, stretch, and do the ordinary things of life, that it's quite hard when the box is removed. Suddenly I find myself needing to plan ahead for days out with the family... to plan ahead! It is a bit of a novelty, and I've almost forgotten that normally there's some certainty about what might happen next weekend. I find myself sometimes nervous, sometimes reluctant; that sense that I'm not sure I want to commit, just in case it doesn't happen. Once bitten, twice shy!

The scars of COVID are emotional and on many different levels. The experience of COVID has been so varied as well. I think of those who I am close to who have lost loved ones to COVID. I think of those whose family members died during this time and they didn't get to say a proper goodbye; to be there at the bedside, to have a proper funeral, and to celebrate their loved ones' lives. The pain continues and the journey of grief is difficult; more complicated for not having had the milestones along the road that you would expect.

Some of us hid away for months and months, but some of us were busier than ever, on the frontline as keyworkers. Nobody's experience is exactly the same as another person's. But we have all been changed and so has the world around us. To a greater or lesser extent, lots of us are struggling with both the changes and with that sense that although the box has been removed, we still feel a bit box shaped.

As I look at the world around us, though, at life bursting out of the ground; the roses springing up outside my window and the lilacs in bloom, I am reminded that if you take a plant and just give it some space, it will find its own way to head towards the sun; find its own space to unfurl and open up. We will each do this in our own timing. We will find our confidence again in time, but we might just need a little help and support. Most of us, once we recognise that we're finding things tough, can make a plan to move forward. But some of us might need to talk about how we feel with friends or family; some might need a little help from outside. All of us need to have some compassion for ourselves and, even more, we need to have compassion for our neighbours.



OUR HISTORIC CHURCHES: ST JAMES



St James's Church

'The gem in the crown of Stanstead Abbotts', so claimed Ian White, the founder of the Stanstead Abbotts Local History Society (SALHS). Queen Elizabeth I must have thought much the same as she worshipped there three times during her summer stays (the Royal Progress) at nearby Stansteadbury Manor.

So what's so special about our St James? It's old. Very old. Built on the site of an even earlier church, the nave walls are stated to be from the twelfth century, while the eastern wall was finished in the thirteenth century. The font is also thirteenth century while the west tower is fifteenth century. Then, at a proposal from Queen Elizabeth I (with a

suggestion you couldn't refuse!), the north chapel was added. This allowed all her huge retinue to be able to worship together. Later Victorian worshippers found themselves, literally,

'boxed in' with the addition of high-panelled box pews, which gives the church a certain uniqueness.

But it's possible that readers may never have seen St James's Church. Its slightly hidden location is just off the Roydon Road, on the left hand side, and was built on one of the highest points in the village's boundary. This elevated location met the spiritual and physical needs of the locals who all lived in that vicinity to escape the regular flooding of the Lea and the Stort rivers. But eventual drainage meant that the villagers could now move and live closer to the river. So going to church meant a steep climb up Cat's Hill, which was very tough on dark winter days with no street lights!

The new Lord of the Manor, Thomas Fowell Buxton of Easneye, at his own expense, built in 1882 a new and more accessible church: St Andrew's. This became our Parish Church and St James was eventually declared redundant in 1977.



PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Great Amwell Parish Council

The Parish Council continues to meet on the second Thursday of each month in the Parish Hall, Hillside Lane at 8.00pm (except August when there is no meeting).

At present, some of the matters the Parish Council is focussed on are listed below:

- * Maintenance of the War Memorial adjoining the New River in Amwell Lane bids are being sought to undertake cleaning works to this structure with the aim that they will be completed during the Summer 2022.
- * The Joint Neighbourhood Plan (JNP) (with Stanstead Abbotts and St Margarets Parishes) part of Great Amwell is, for the purposes of the JNP, within a designated area (Stanstead Abbotts) of the District Council's local plan that has a target for housing provision. The JNP aims to identify sites for such development (amongst other things). A finalised proposed JNP will be subject to a local referendum before it can be adopted.
- * Repairs to the Parish Stocks (located in the Churchyard) works are due to commence during the Summer.

The Parish Council has its own website that provides parishioners with useful information. Details of your parish councillors and recent copies of meeting agendas and minutes can be found at https://gtamwellpc.org. The business considered varies from the monthly planning applications, planning enforcement and highways issues of concern to ad hoc matters ranging from reports of anti-social behaviour, litter and on-street parking. If you have an issue of concern, that falls within the remit of local government, then please contact the parish council (greatamwellpc@virginmedia.com) to make your views known.

St Margarets Parish Council

The Council has continued with selected projects that not only benefit the community, but also the environment, which includes working with Lea Valley Regional Parks to improve the green area by The Jolly Fisherman and improving the wildlife habitat in the Nigel Copping field within Sanville Gardens.

We have been investigating funding our own PCSO; however, with crime figures being at a low level and our local police enforcement officers dealing with issues in a timely manner, it was decided that a PCSO is currently not needed. We are however proceeding with our request for speeding checks on specific roads. We continue to work with all the Parishes to complete the Neighbourhood Plan.

Stanstead Abbotts Parish Council

The Council have successfully secured a grant for some much-needed improvements in the High Street and the village playground. Over the coming months all the bollards and the railings in the High Street are going to be repainted, a new fence is going to be erected around the outdoor gym that was installed last year and the damaged playground surface is going to be replaced, as well as a new piece of toddler equipment to replace the spinner that was destroyed by fire last year. We have also received some funding that has enabled us to purchase over a mile of bunting to decorate the High Street ahead of the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. As we were not able to tie the bunting to the lampposts in the High Street, this was handed out in May to those who wished to decorate their properties.

The Council have organised a Jubilee Party in conjunction with Stanstead Abbotts and St Margaret's Village Club on Friday 3rd June from 12–4, kindly sponsored by Oliver Minton. The event will be held in the car park of The Village Club and is a FREE event to bring the community together to celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. We have tried to involve as many local organisations as possible and include:

- * Live Music and dance performances on an outdoor stage, which is being built by French & Jupps
- * Tombola and Children's Lucky Bags by Bobtails Playgroup

SPIKE'S STORY OF STRENGTH

In April 2021, local teen Spike had a serious skateboarding accident, falling headfirst into a wall in Lower Road, Great Amwell. Mum, Carrie, shares the story.



I'm not sure where it started and where it ended. I remember hearing the air ambulance and the sirens, feeling my stomach sink, and the last text I'd had from Spike asking what time he had to be home. I remember seeing my phone flash with a call from Spike and feeling relieved to see his name come up. I answered it and it was a police officer. I got into an unmarked police car and they said we had to get to The Royal London Hospital now. I remember looking at the speedometer, the blue lights, and that my phone kept ringing and I wished it would stop. My memory stops there until I had to sign the consent forms for the brain surgery — a full right side craniectomy to save Spike's life.

When Spike arrived at the hospital he was intubated and ventilated, with a slim chance of survival. Spike was placed in an induced coma and taken

straight into theatre. He had a broken skull, cheekbone and eye socket. They had to remove part of the bone from the skull to expose the brain and release the swelling. The injury had also damaged the nerve in Spike's eye. Spike had a team of neurosurgeons working on him and a specialist maxillofacial team.

His prognosis wasn't clear as the damage to the right side of his brain was significant, and the CT scan showed he also had possible damage to the gland in the base of his brain, which controls hormones and growth. However, the consultants were quietly confident as Spike passed the critical 72-hour stage. Progress was slow but positive.

After five days in hospital Spike woke up. He was breathing unaided, and we even got a thumbs up. He was confused but talking — and asked for David Bowie music! It was an amazing day; my boy was alive! We could leave critical care behind us and





After bravely enduring three major surgeries and over 13 weeks in hospital, made even more difficult with COVID restrictions in place, Spike was discharged

to begin rehabilitation at home. While it has been a really hard thing to go through, it is good to be able to say now that Spike's doing really well, progressing all the time. He attends school every morning – the fatigue gets to him occasionally, but he enjoys being back and mixing with his friends. We've fallen into a routine and things are starting to feel slightly normal again.

We want to say thank you to the Herts & Essex Air Ambulance and Hertfordshire Police, and the residents of Lower Road, Great Amwell, who helped before the emergency services arrived. Thank you to everyone at The Royal London Hospital who supported us. And finally thank you to everyone at The Children's Trust.

It's certainly been a journey, but Spike's now back at home with a bright future ahead.

Everyone at The Three Villages wishes Spike the very best as he continues on his road to recovery. His story is one of strength, community spirit, hope and positivity for the future.

BUSINESS SPOTLIGHT: THE WALLED GARDEN

Gini Trower, a Montessori trained teacher with a degree in Environmental Conservation, tells us all about The Walled Garden and her passion to continue the three-hundred-year-old tradition to grow vegetables in this stunning, seventeenth-century garden.

I married into the Trower family who have lived in the parish of Stanstead Abbotts since 1855. We moved back here with our four children in 2001. Stanstead Bury Farm is our smallholding and part of our garden is a walled garden that is nearly half an acre in size. The walls of The Walled Garden are all seventeenth-century red brick and listed. As far as we know it was originally created to grow vegetables and fruit, and this is a tradition that I wanted to continue.

With my background in education, I was keen to get children in the garden with their families. For the last 12 years I have spent part of my week working outdoors in schools with small children of all ages, to get them interested in gardening and to allow them the chance to grow and maintain plants.





In 2017 I created a Facebook page (The Walled Garden Stanstead Abbotts) and a website (www.thewalledgardenherts.com) asking people if they would be interested in garden workshops in our Walled Garden. The idea was to have families learning about growing food and having fun whilst doing so, and then buying some of the vegetables that we had grown. I was also keen to have some help with the jobs and be with others in The Walled Garden as it is much more fun doing it together.

In March 2018 we had our first session in the snow! Since then (apart from COVID disruptions) we have generally had workshops twice a month from March to October, although we recently had a snowdrop rescue session in January. The sessions usually last for two hours. We walk around the garden working out what jobs need doing and then everyone chooses what they want

to do. The Walled Garden is totally enclosed so is very safe and the children can just run around the paths exploring if they want.

On the farm we have a small herd of Red Poll Cows and I sell my beef locally, and I have hosted a couple of popup restaurants in our hay barn in support of local food and producers. In 2019 Stort Valley Organic came to help us. They help in The Walled Garden and rent one of our fields for growing vegetables. They are responsible for





certifying The Walled Garden as organic. They operate a vegetable box scheme from the farm. They, like me, are keen to promote local food and use the benefits of natural resources to provide a balanced ecosystem for growing healthy plants. We understand the importance of soil and making compost and working with nature. We grow as sustainably as we can and harvest our rain water.

I have a lot of families who have been coming to The Walled Garden since I started and to me that is very special, but it is also great to welcome new people and to give others the opportunity to spend time in this beautiful tranquil place.

RECIPE: PEANUT BUTTER AND OAT COOKIES

Another easy recipe using just five ingredients! You can freeze for up to 2 months (after step 5), then cook from frozen by adding 2 minutes to the cooking time. If you want to reduce the sugar quantity a little, just add more oats.

INGREDIENTS

200g peanut butter 100g golden caster sugar ½ tsp fine table salt 1 large egg Handful of rolled oats

METHOD

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180° C / 160 Fan / Gas Mark 4.
- 2. Line a baking tray with grease-proof paper.
- 3. Measure out the peanut butter and sugar into a bowl. Add $\frac{1}{4}$ tsp of salt and mix well.
- 4. Add the egg (beaten) and handful of oats, and mix again until it forms a rough dough.
- 5. Break off small chunks and place on the baking tray. Press the cookies down lightly with the back of a fork.
- 6. Bake for 12 minutes, until golden around the edges and soft in the middle.
- 7. Take out of the oven and cool on the tray for 10 minutes, then transfer to a wire rack and cool completely.
- 8. Store in an air-tight container for up to 3 days.

Past Pupil: Frank Brown



St Andrew's Church of England (VC) Primary School

In so many ways our children at St Andrew's live and breathe our school vision, 'Learn to love and love to learn; in God's love each one will shine.'



This spring term has been a very busy one helping them to love to learn through a variety of different topics. There has been a definite historical and geographic bias with our Early Years exploring different 'Traditional Tales', Year 1 learning all about 'Castles', Year 2 becoming 'Explorers', Year 3 considering our 'Extreme Earth', Year 4 studying 'Rainforests', Year 5 learning about the Anglo-Saxons and Vikings and finally our



Year 6 class studying WW2. Visits have included trips to Bletchley Park (Y6), St Alban's Cathedral (Y2), Palmers Green Mosque (Y3) and a residential trip at Stibbington for our Year 5 class. Year 1 had an exciting castle experience day and our Early Years had the awe and wonder of a delivery of fertilised eggs, which they watched as the chicks hatched and grew. Indeed, our chick webcam was very popular with all of our school for the two weeks the chicks were with us.



Alongside all of the learning, our Year 6 leadership team have initiated a number of charitable activities to help care for and help others. Some of the events organised by them have included Red Nose Day, Number Day activities on behalf of the NSPCC, World Book Day, cake sales and collecting donations for the people of Ukraine. Sport too remains high on the agenda with our flourishing netball and football team events, inter-school cross country events, a 'rapid fire cricket' tournament and a Sports Hall Athletics festival, which we won!

Finally, we have finished our spring term with a flurry of Easter activities. For the first time in over two years, the whole school joined together at St Andrew's Church for our Easter service. Led by our Year 6 leadership team and Spiritual Leads, we had readings and songs reflecting on the events of Easter Week. Our Year 3 and Year 4 classes have also brought these events to life through their end of term Easter performance. The children showed such confidence performing and all of the solos and speeches were outstanding.

We are now looking forward to more learning excitement in the summer term.

UPDATES FROM OUR LOCAL SCHOOLS



Amwell View School and Specialist Sports College

Amwell View School and Specialist Sports College said goodbye to their Headteacher, Jan Liversage, who has worked for the school for exactly 34 years to the day. Jan joined Amwell View School, a maintained special school for pupils with severe learning and complex difficulties aged 2–19 years old, as a Senior Teacher on the 1st April 1988 and retired on the 1st April 2022.

The local authority seconded Jan to complete a BPhil (MIS) in order to set up Deaf Blind Provision, which is still in place today. Following this piece of work she joined the Senior Leadership Team as Deputy Headteacher in October 1994 and was appointed the Headteacher in September 1999.



A Bid for Autism provision at Amwell View School was successful and created specialist provision for children with ASD. Today the school has 62% of pupils with a diagnosis of Autism. Following this success, Jan developed an Outreach Service to support children with special educational needs in mainstream schools.

Jan has successfully led the school through four consecutive Ofsted Inspections to achieve 'Outstanding' ratings in 2006–07, 2009–10, 2014–15 and 2018–19.

During Jan's Headship the school's pupil roll increased from 60 to 154. Jan made this possible by increasing the school capacity through a number of innovative building, redesign and refurbishment projects. The school continued to grow and develop recently with a new Music Department, additional classroom and post-16 provision.

There have been a number of school facilities and resources that were developed under Jan's leadership, not limited to, but includina:

- * The refurbishment of the school swimming pool and the building of a new classroom for post-16 students offering spacious learning environments that complement the curriculum.
- * The building of the 'Rosie Rainbow' Dance Studio complete with sprung flooring and a music system with lights and mirrored wall, which is a spacious learning environment. Above the Dance Studio is another new classroom for more post-16 students.
- * State-of-the-art multi-purpose Sensory Room with multi-sensory equipment including the Magic Carpet, water-bed, dark and light rooms, as well as the bubble tubes and sensory lights.
- * The Salon where pupils, as part of the curriculum, can desensitise having their hair washed, brushed and cut. The Salon is also used by the Specialist Dentists who are able to screen the pupils in an environment that is familiar for the children.
- * Soft Play, which was extended 2019–20, offering a large space for fun, play and learning.
- * The building of a new staff room and offices on the first floor enabled the school to refurbish and repurpose office space on the ground floor to become additional learning spaces and classrooms.

Jan's successor is Neil Ward who has worked at the school for 17 years. He joined Jan as the Co-Headteacher for the 18 months before she retired, and has been appointed to the position of Headteacher. We wish Jan all the best in her retirement and future ventures, just as we wish Neil every success in his new role.

MEET A LOCAL: VICKY BURT

Our own Rosemary Imroth had a good chat with fellow local and Evergreen Club member, Vicky Burt. Here's what she found out...

Vicky Burt has been at the core of Stanstead Abbotts ever since she came here from Roydon in 1967. Stanstead Abbotts was a totally different village then – shops on both sides of the road, lots of public houses and some factories that employed most of the local population. One of these was F. G. Burt at the Mill, the manufacturer of mirrors, secondary and double glazing, and all flat glassware. It was in this factory that Vicky thoroughly enjoyed her involvement in the financial department.

Vicky wed Jeremy, one of the six sons of Kenneth Burt, and proceeded to bring up their family, run the home, work in the factory, and especially create a magnificent garden in her spare time.

Time passed and the many shops closed one by one, sometimes due to new regulations, sometimes as the owners decided to retire, not to mention the ability of people to shop further away. The trains to the centre of London made a great change in the people who live in Stanstead Abbotts – commuters rather than local descendants. The factories closed or reduced to specialising and the village became home to a totally different population with small knots of long-stay residents.

The primary school (St Andrew's) and the Parish Hall remain, and both have been and are very much at the core of the present Stanstead Abbotts. Vicky is the upholder of the status of the Parish Hall as the central place for all local clubs, societies and general meetings. So many clubs and societies meet there: the Stanstead Abbotts Local History Society, the Irish Dancing Club, Carpet Bowls, Table Tennis Club and the Evergreen Club. Vicky has become Joint Chairman of the Evergreen Club and can be seen every Monday transporting elderly members to and from the club, helping with the teas, running the monthly raffle, but she has not been able to come to terms with the Bingo automatic numbering machine!

Her garden, at Abbotts House, was wonderful and was admired by all those lucky enough to see it. Vicky had invited the members of the Evergreen Club to enjoy a garden tea party there at least once a year in the summer and it was eagerly anticipated by the members, the more able of whom took great pleasure in wandering about and admiring the various different garden 'rooms'. My strongest memory of Vicky is during an Evergreen garden party: the sun became too hot for the ladies sitting around a table, so Vicky jumped onto the table and raised the sun-shade for them!

Sadly, Vicky has sold her house in Stanstead Abbotts and is now moving to pastures new. She will be missed by all who knew her and we wish Vicky all the best for the future!



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VOLUNTEERING FOR CANAL & RIVER TRUST

It's been over four years since a small group of local volunteers signed up with Canal & River Trust (CRT) to become moorings rangers. Historically, this was as a result of some anti-social behaviour along the riverbank one summer, which was affecting the daily lives of not just land dwellers, but also those who enjoy the quiet life living on the river.

Our role is a simple one, but over time we have extended our volunteering activities. It's not just limited to recording on a regular basis the boats that are moored along a designated stretch of the Lea. We also report fly-tipping along the towpath, help CRT with signage installation, liaise with CRT over any queries that are raised with us and keep the local Parish Council updated of our work. Currently we are in contact with CRT regarding the quality of accessibility to the towpath and asking that specific areas are reviewed for improvement.

We were aware that our presence at the outset was not met with positivity with the minority, and we are probably still seen a little like 'marmite' to some. However, feedback has given us the reassurance that we are doing something good, and we will continue our work to ensure that we are all able to live alongside each other in a peaceful and happy way.

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
