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FROM THE VICAR

We love athletics in our family, thanks in part to my husband's experience as a 110m hurdler, and so we are big fans of the Commonwealth Games and of the Olympics. This year's coverage will find us glued to our screens to follow the excitement, but not before we have got a little local Olympic fun underway!

This year is an exciting year as the Olympics return again to Paris in 2024, 100 years after the exhilarating games of 1924. The rivalry and races of Paris 1924 were immortalised in the 1981 film Chariots of Fire in which the extraordinary athletic abilities of two very different men were explored. Eric Liddell and Harold Abrahams came from different religious and social backgrounds but were brought together by their talent as young athletes, and trained and raced ready for the 1924 Olympics. There they represented Great Britain, coming home with their hard won medals; Eric Liddell with a Gold for the 400m and Harold Abrahams with Britain's first 100m Gold medal.





Harold Abrahams lived his later life in the village of Great Amwell, having married Sybil Gordon, an actress and singer whose best remembered performances were of Gilbert & Sullivan roles. Harold had a distinguished career as a Barrister, while continuing his involvement in athletics both by commentating and by serving the sport as Chairman of the Amateur Athletics Association. Sybil and Harold were involved in village and church life, and when he died in 1978 he was buried with Sybil in the Churchyard of St John the Baptist.

It is this connection between our village and Harold Abrahams and his gold medal, awarded 100 years ago now, that we are celebrating this July. The Village Olympics, advertised on our inside front cover, is planned as a chance to come together and have some fun, run some races, enjoy some games and build community. So make sure you have it in your diary, pack a picnic, get your running shoes on and let's celebrate together. I will be praying very hard for the weather to be glorious!

LOCAL HISTORIC FACES & PLACES: ARCHIE MILLER

Archie Miller was born c.1868 as one of eight brothers and sisters living all his life in Stanstead Abbotts. He was one of the well-known Miller family whose surname is commemorated in Millers Lane.

Much of his working life was spent with the Metropolitan Water Board looking after the channel and grassy banks of the New River. He became famous as an otter catcher, as well as for buying his own coffin long before he needed one!

In 1927, aged 59, while attending a friend's funeral he was rather taken by the fine oak coffin. So, he asked the undertaker if he would make one just like it for him – it was delivered within a week for £23! He often encouraged interested visitors to take his picture while sitting in his coffin. He told a Daily Mirror reporter that he also slept in it at night! Local myth has him leaving the coffin propped up against the parapet of the river bridge!

Archie kept an immaculate garden at his home in Riverside Cottages, which provided him a good supply of vegetables. One of his early achievements was the construction of a shack at the bottom of his garden made out of discarded materials. This formed a museum of sorts, which housed many items that he had picked up and salted away. An old empty clock case was to be found at the entrance to the museum that was appropriately labelled 'No Tick'.

In 1951 he was interviewed by a newspaper that reported that Archie had a six-foot-long unpolished oak coffin with a fine silk lining! The wider public was particularly interested in Archie's additional occupation as an Otter Catcher. The newspaper mentioned that he had killed 87 Otters and it was thought that this tally was a record for any one individual. It was also explained how coping with otters was dangerous as they were vicious things, and one had attacked Archie and mauled his face. When Archie appeared on the BBC radio programme *In Town Tonight*, he emphasised the risky nature of catching otters: he said that 'If you have never touched an otter, you do not want to, they are dangerous'.

By 1978, largely because of Archie's exploits, all otters had disappeared from our part of the Lea Valley. But in 1991 otters bred in captivity were released locally back in to the wild. These otters were released quite close to the Amwell Magna Fishery where Archie had previously been paid to kill otters. However, all this took place well after Archie had died in 1959, some 41 years after he had purchased his oak coffin with rosewood inlay and silk lining.

P.S. Have you seen one of the local otters? A photo even? If so, please let the Editor know.

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PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Great Amwell Parish Council



The picture of the Memorial was taken following the last refurbishment project funded by the Parish Council.

The Parish Council continues to meet on the second Thursday of each month in the Parish Hall, Hillside Lane at 8.00pm (except August when there is no meeting).

Previous articles have outlined various issues considered by the Parish Council and projects it is pursuing. As the lowest tier of local government in Hertfordshire, the Parish Council has few statutory powers. Its focus is on representing local views to the principal authorities (Herts County Council and East Herts District Council) and Government agencies on various matters. Additionally, it aims to maintain the environmental wellbeing of the parish through activities such as litter picking.

The Parish Council is responsible for the upkeep and maintenance of the War Memorial along Amwell Lane. The siting of the memorial near to a waterway is not ideal from a maintenance perspective!

St Margarets Parish Council



St Margaret's Parish Council are working with the Ware & Stanstead Abbotts Safer Neighbourhood Team to offer a 'Coffee with a Cop' session in the parish, which will give residents the opportunity to raise issues or concerns or to just get some advice. A date and venue will be announced shortly. In addition, the team want to hold a community event in the area in the summer months, so watch this space.

We are continuing to liaise with the District/County Councils to sort flooding issues on Hoddesdon Road, the junction of Station Road/Lawrence Avenue, St Margarets Road and Hailey Lane. In addition, we have asked that some repair works are carried out to the road surface on Hailey Lane. We have also requested that litter on the highways, particularly the A10/A414 slip roads, are dealt with.

We are working towards some improvements in the area, which includes dealing with the graffiti on the A414 flyover pillars, introducing a new noticeboard at the Nigel Copping Community Building on Hoddesdon Road, and relocating the noticeboard on Lawrence Avenue to the corner of Station Road to capture more of an audience. We have also had a request for a bench at the bus stop by St Mary the Virgin, St Margarets church. Would you like to volunteer?



EAST HERTS COMMUNITY SAFETY PARTNERSHIP

East Herts Community Safety Partnership (CSP) is a collection of agencies, including Herts Police, East Herts Council, Herts Fire & Rescue, Housing Associations and Hertfordshire County Council, that work together to ensure that the district remains a safe place to live, visit and work. There can be occasions where communities experience anti-social or nuisance behaviour, and residents can be unsure of how and who they can report incidents to. To enable the CSP to take positive and robust action against individuals or groups responsible for anti-social behaviour (ASB), they require evidence from the community about the type of behaviour, when and where it is happening and how it is affecting the quality of life of others.

For several reasons people may feel reluctant to report incidents, provide statements or attend court. However, hearsay evidence can be presented on behalf of residents, by members of the CSP relaying facts they have been told rather than residents having to make statements or attend court.

The CSP will also utilise a range of other measures to address ASB and nuisance behaviour such as environmental improvements, prevention and engagement. A range of support services are also available for those who may experience challenging situations.

- * Contact the police non-emergency number, 101. This is charged at a local rate and operates 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. 101 online reporting is also available at https://heport.com/heport.

- * Call Crimestoppers anonymously on 0800 555 111.
- * If you are a tenant of a housing association, or are having problems with a tenant, you can contact them as they have powers to tackle ASB.

ART & LITERATURE IN THE WAITING ROOM

A project delivered by your Community Rail Partnership Officer, Katie Goldthorpe

As part of Greater Anglia's ongoing station improvements, the Waiting Room at St Margarets on the New River Line was identified as needing an upgrade. The whole project needed to be completed in under three months.

I was invited to the initial planning meeting in January 2023 along with a team from Greater Anglia, their contractors and Robin our station adopter. I was keen to ensure that the refurbished space was welcoming and would become a place that the community could take pride in. I suggested a mural instead of a plain grey wall and shelves to be incorporated into the design. Following a previous discussion with the Parish Council I knew they wanted to have a book swap in the village and this would provide a great location. These proposals were accepted so I got straight to work. The aim was to have a waiting room that the community could take pride in and that offered passengers a comfortable, interesting and inspiring place to sit and wait for their train.

I offered to contact the painter of the original mural, to organise the re-homing of the old benches, to source and pay for the mural and to start the community book swap. The artist of the original mural, which he had painted in 2002, was surprised to hear it was still there, so he wasn't too upset to hear it was going to be painted over! Pleasingly one of the benches went to St Andrew's Primary School.







Due to the tight timescale I contacted Paul Wood, a local photographer who is always so generous in sharing his images, to see if he could supply five images of the area for the community to choose from for the new mural. He agreed and the voting process was launched via social media. Over 200 people placed a vote and the winning image received over 50% of the votes: 'it is unmistakably Stanstead Abbotts' read one comment. The image was reproduced on a huge sticker by local company, Universal Signs and installed by their team.

Once the shelves had been built and the waiting room became accessible, I sent out a request for books and let local companies and organisations know they could leave flyers there. The shelves were full within a couple of weeks. I also contacted local author Annette Hannah who had been inspired by the station for one of her books. Annette kindly left a number of her books for people to borrow.

It was a fantastic project to work on and we were pleased to have been shortlisted at the annual Community Rail Awards. Unfortunately we didn't win, but with over 180 submissions we did well to get shortlisted!

CHARITY FOCUS: ESSEX & HERTS AIR AMBULANCE



Your local life-saving charity

Did you know that your local air ambulance service is a charity, run solely on donations? You would be forgiven for thinking that the helicopters of Essex & Herts Air Ambulance (EHAAT) often seen flying overhead are part of the NHS. But this free life-saving service provided 24/7 by helicopters and rapid response vehicles (RRVs) receives limited government funding and no National Lottery grants. The charity relies on the goodwill of local people and businesses across Hertfordshire and Essex to raise enough funds to cover the significant operational costs involved in providing such a vital medical emergency service.

Last year, their critical care team treated just over 1,900 patients, operating from two strategically located airbases: Earls Colne and North Weald. Each critical care team consists of a pilot and co-pilot, a pre-hospital care doctor and a critical care paramedic who can be rushed to the scene of a medical emergency with life-saving equipment to deliver advanced clinical care, usually only available in the hospital emergency department. Many patients have received blood transfusions from the blood carried on board the helicopters and RRVs.

There are many volunteers who lend a helping hand to support the charity, and all play an important part and are very highly valued as part of the team. Jane Morton, EHAAT Volunteer Manager explains: 'The core of our operations extends beyond our fleet of helicopters and advanced medical interventions, it's the spirit of our supporters and volunteers that drive us forward. From helping in our charity shops to sorting treasures in our warehouses, picking up collection tins, giving engaging visitor centre tours and supporting events, every hour of volunteering makes a meaningful difference. Yet, it's more than the tasks at hand — it's about making connections and lasting friendships. Whether it's sharing experiences, learning new skills, or stepping in to support community events, our volunteers not only impact our operations as a charity but inspire others and create positive change across our local communities.'




Embark on Sky High Family Fun! Sunday 14th July, 12–4pm at Hatfield House, AL9 5HX

St Andrew's Church of England (VC) Primary School

Our Spring Term has been full of interesting trips and visitors, which have enriched the taught curriculum.

In February we celebrated NSPCC Number Day, during which we raised money for this great cause whilst also completing lots of fun number activities and dressing up as numbers. Another opportunity to dress up was provided by our World Book Day, during which the children investigated their favourite authors and shared some of the books that they love.



In March we started off our Science Week with a really exciting science circus workshop. The children were equally amazed and challenged by many of the tricks and performances shown, all exploring forces. Everyone enjoyed watching a staff member try to ride a teeny tiny bike, and held their breath as they watched an amazing juggling display on a very tall unicycle! After the show, the children took part in workshops, helping them to explore how forces work upon us all at all times. Our younger children, in Nursery and Reception, explored light and shadow creating a theatre complete with some wonderful shadow puppets.


Other events during the Spring Term included a visit of chicks to the Early Years. The children watched them hatch and then helped to take care of them. Year 1 had a special History morning examining toys from Hertford Museum, considering how they differed to toys that they own at home.

Year 2 had a day of awe and wonder as they visited St Albans Cathedral. The children learnt about the special symbols and places within the cathedral, and visited the different areas in this beautiful building. They listened carefully to the tour guides who told them many interesting facts about the history and purpose of the building. In the afternoon, the children had a chance to make clay tiles, inspired by the morning's tour.

Our Year 5 class had a terrific time at Hudnall Park on their two-night residential trip.

The site lends itself to a variety of environmental activities, and on their final day the children went go-carting and enjoyed stories, games and marshmallows around the camp fire.

In our final week of the Spring Term we held our Easter church service at St Andrew's Church where Rev'd Sarah and our class speakers led us through the momentous events of Holy Week. Finally, our wonderful Year 3 and 4 children performed their Easter play that mapped out the events from Palm Sunday, through the Crucifixion, leading to the Resurrection of Jesus. It was wonderful to see the confidence of the performers shining out and their singing was absolutely amazing.











UPDATES FROM OUR LOCAL SCHOOLS



St John the Baptist CE VA Primary





This term we have taken a deep dive into books, helping our children develop a real love of reading. We marked World Book Day with an exciting day of activities, joining in with online lessons with authors, enjoying shared reading times between classes and holding a book swap. In some classes, the children used Rock, Paper, Scissors to decide on who would take home a specific book. We also used this day to

launch our new Stay and Read sessions for parents. Parents can join their child in class each Friday morning, to stay and read with them and other children in the class. We have also introduced a weekly 10-Minute Book Club, where a small group of children in each class share a review of a book they have recently read. This has certainly had impact in getting the children reading from a wider genre of books, and pupils have been going to the library and book shops to select the books recommended. Teachers have also been reviewing the texts they use to teach writing and we have partnered with the Book Nook in Ware, to source a range of exciting new stimulus texts.





We were very pleased to be able to build a new Summer House on our school field this term, thanks to the incredible fundraising by St John's PTFA. This structure will help enhance our Forest School provision, as well as providing a shady spot during sunny playtimes on the field over the Summer Term. The school gathered together to celebrate its grand opening.



Children have continued to participate in events hosted by the local sports partnership. Our netball team came second in the medium schools' tournament; children from Years 3–6 took part in the Cross Country competition and many of those participating were pleased that they improved on their personal best from the last run; Years 5 and 6 competed in the Sportshall Athletics competition, with the Year 6 boys teaming coming third; our football team reached the semi-finals in the Hope Cup competition and came second in the medium schools' football tournament. We are looking forward to our Sports Week in the Summer Term.

Our Spring Term drew to a close with a performance by Years 4 and 5 of The Gospel Show: a moving depiction of the life, death and resurrection of Jesus. Children from both year groups gave incredible performances and we enjoyed some brilliant small group and solo singing.

UPDATES FROM OUR LOCAL SCHOOLS



Amwell View School and Specialist Sports College

As mentioned in our last updated, Amwell View School and Specialist Sports College has recently opened a new learning space at the school called 'The Hatch'. It continues to be a huge success and offer some fantastic new learning experiences.

Amwell View's Class 4 is for pupils who have profound and multiple learning disabilities, and the Spring Term saw the return of The Class 4 Café. Lisa Dillon, Class 4 Teacher said:



The pupils were split into two teams, Team Cake and Team Biscuit. They made cakes and biscuits in their Food Technology lessons to offer to their peers in The Class 4 Café or provide a takeaway service from The Hatch.

Some pupils use Eye Gaze technology to decide what ingredients we need and what flavours to add, while others use switches to operate the food mixers. All pupils use their senses to explore the ingredients, and demonstrate preference and choices by smell, taste, touch and sight.

Some classes visit The Hatch, where Class 4 pupils provide a takeaway service. This provides another opportunity for Class 4 pupils to use their Eye Gaze technology, Big Mack switches and symbols to communicate with their peers.

Amwell View School's RE and Sensory Week (5th–9th February 2024) was celebrating the Lunar New Year, which is the beginning of the New Year based on the lunar calendar. 

HERTFORDSHIRE REEDBED CONSERVATION IS A BOOMING SUCCESS

A Bittern has been heard making a mating call in Hertfordshire for the first time in recent history following a long-term conservation project to create more reedbed habitat for the protected species. Prompted by the near-extinction of the Bittern – a member of the heron family – and led by the RSPB, a huge nationwide conservation effort to create more reedbed habitat took place in the early years of the millennium.

Locally, Herts and Middlesex Wildlife Trust worked with conservation partners and, from 2004–2010, doubled the area of Bittern-suitable reedbed in the region to 24 hectares – the equivalent of about 33 football pitches. At Amwell Nature Reserve, the Trust improved the reserve's reedbeds to provide undisturbed places for Bittern to hunt with the hope that the birds would eventually breed there. That vision came a step closer on 5th March 2024, when a male Bittern was recorded 'booming' (a mating call which sounds like the low pitched 'hooo' from blowing across the top of a bottle) for the first time at Amwell, signifying that the bird feels the habitat and food is good enough to consider trying to attract a mate there. Its booming has since been repeated and whilst a second bird has not been seen answering it yet, this is being noted as great progress by the wildlife charity and other local conservationists.

Tim Hill, Conservation Manager at Herts and Middlesex Wildlife Trust, says:

In 1997, the Bittern was recorded at its lowest ebb with just 11 booming males left in the UK. Across the county, and with our partner organisations, guided by a dedicated Bittern conservation action plan, we have worked hard to create more reedbed habitat for these elusive birds, scarce and shy birds. It's fantastic for all concerned to see the reports of this breakthrough booming and clearly demonstrates that we can reverse the terrible declines we are seeing in our native wildlife, through conservation management and action. [...] You might wonder why a Bittern heard booming at Amwell is important and relevant so let's put that into context; The State of Nature report (2023) showed that one in six species is at risk of extinction, with that number climbing to 43% among bird species, so good news stories such as this one really do provide hope for the future of our ecosystem.

The Bittern is a well-camouflaged bird, with pale brown plumage, streaked with beige and black markings, distinctive yellow eyes, bony feet and a daggersharp beak. In contrast to its more commonly seen cousin, the Grey Heron, the Bittern is shorter and more thick set. Back in time, when reedbeds were more prevalent, the Bittern was a common bird, hunted for the table and in East Anglia was known as the fenmans' roast! In keeping with its stocky appearance, the Bittern has a thick layer of fat (this was liked by cooks, who appreciated its selfbasting quality) but thankfully, Bitterns are now protected by law and no longer make an appearance on the menu. The male's 'booming' together with its love of wet reedbed habitat and its once common population in Norfolk and Suffolk, has earned the bird its nicknames of 'bogblutter' - and also 'bull of the bog' and 'bog monster'. In Hertfordshire, Bitterns are now a frequent winter visitor to Amwell and have been sighted at Rye Meads and Marsworth Reservoir, but are yet to breed once again in the county. According to survey results from the RSPB and Natural England, published in 2023, there were 228 booming Bittern males counted in the 2022 breeding season – an increase of 1973% over 25 years. Amwell's booming bird will now enhance those encouraging statistics further still.

Members of the public are welcome to try hearing the Bittern booming, by visiting the James Hide at Amwell Nature Reserve. The birds are likely to be most vocal at dawn during March and early April.

How it works

The East Herts Community Benefit Lottery is a weekly online lottery. All funds raised go to good causes that benefit the

Each ticket costs £1 per week and consists of six numbers. The more numbers you match in a draw the bigger the prize you win! There is a 50:1 chance to win prizes up to the £25,000 jackpo

Good causes receive 50p from every ticket purchased via their lottery page. A further 10p is distributed to other local good causes via the central fund 20p goes towards the prizes which can be won by supporters every week and 20p covers the cost of running the lottery and VAT.

Applying is easy - it's all done online and takes a few minutes. East Herts Council lottery team will check each cause qualifies with the 'cause conditions' and approve them. A full list of criteria can be found on the website

Once you're approved the sky is the limit - you can go and sell as many tickets as you wish to start raising unlimited funds for your cause! We provide all of the marketing materials you need to spread the word to your community via Facebook, Twitter or leaflets, plus there are additional special offers throughout the year. All you need to do is shout about the lottery to your supporters


