

#### FROM THE VICAR

As September arrives, suddenly I have been in the villages for four years. The funny thing about arriving in a parish as the vicar or priest in charge is that you are often the last person who arrived: the newest resident, but with one of the oldest jobs, in and around some of the oldest buildings!

Thankfully, we have people with a knowledge and passion for our four churches, and we also have the local expertise to keep them in good condition.

Fundraising to keep the churches from falling down is a continuous effort in most parishes, and in the last four years I have seen the incredible work of the congregations as they try to do their best to preserve the churches for the next hundred years and more. The tower repairs at St John the Baptist last year are a great example of the passion, toil and cost, which came to £90,000!



When the plans and costings come in for a job, big or small, one of the places we can go to for help is the Beds & Herts Historic Churches Trust who provides grants. They in turn rely on donations and fundraising, and their biggest annual event is in September, with the Bike 'n' Hike. This sponsored cycle ride or walk is a

fantastic opportunity to see the churches in the area and to raise money to keep all of them open. The funds raised by biker/hikers go two ways: half is donated to the Trust and half goes directly to the church you choose.

Last year the largest fundraising effort across the two counties came from our benefice in the efforts of Jonathan Trower, who as Chair of the Friends of St James' committee decided to hit the road and cycle his heart out, earning a gold certificate and raising £3,027!

This year in response to his amazing performance, we are encouraging the wider community to join in by creating a local circular route map for our churches in the benefice, which is perfect for children and families, and is a great starting point for more experienced walkers and cyclists too. Refreshments will be provided at each church, so it's a great way to explore, have fun and raise money for some of our oldest buildings!

#### LOCAL HISTORIC FACES & PLACES: EMIGRANTS TO THE NEW WORLD

Immigrants crossing the sea in perilous small boats? Nothing new there, then! Following the success of the pioneering pilgrims on the Mayflower (1620) from 1630 to 1640, a staggering total of around 20,000 people left the British Isles for the New World. They were part of what became known as The Great Migration. And some folk from Stanstead Abbotts and nearby villages were among them!

During those ten years church ministers and their church members, sometimes complete congregations and even complete villages, risked the journey. They were all leaving everything they owned, which in many cases may not have been much, selling what they could to pay the fare, and heading for an unknown and very uncertain future. As suggested by the large number of clergy, their reasons had to do with their quest for freedom to worship how they wished.

Among ministers with some local connection, we know of three: Samuel Stone who was born in Hertford and founded Hartford, Connecticut in 1636 (his statue stands outside Castle Hall in Hertford); Charles Chauncy, a vicar of St Mary's Church, Ware, who was appointed the first president of the prestigious Harvard College in 1654; and John Eliot, born in Widford but growing up in Nazeing, who became a missionary in 1646 to the 'Indians' near the town of Roxbury in Massachusetts where he was the minister.

In that era it's reckoned that only a third of the population could write and so ships' manifests were not always reliable. But on the good ship Hopewell, which left these shores in 1635 (the same year that Edward Baesh opened his grammar school in the Clock House), the manifest lists five folk from our village: Laurence Whittimor (63) 'a husbandman', Elizabeth Whittimor (57), Robert Day (30), Elizabeth Turner (26), Wm. Peacock (12) and Sara Elliott (6) with evidence that her parents were also on board.

Laurence was a husbandman, i.e. 'a man who tills or cultivates the ground; a farmer' (Oxford English Dictionnary). We do not know if he owned a piece of his own land or was a tenant. He must have had some possessions to be able to sell them to pay for his and his wife's passage to New England. Laurence was 63 and Elizabeth was 57 when they embarked on the Hopewell to bravely face this new adventure in their lives. In the seventeenth century, the average expected life span was around 35 to 40, so Laurence and his wife's comparative longevity reflects well on the healthy environment of Stanstead Abbotts! He died at Roxbury near Boston at the age of 72; his wife had died a year earlier.

The only other passenger that we have information about is Robert Day. He was born in Stanstead Abbotts probably in 1605 and was a brickmaker by trade. Following the ship's arrival he moved almost immediately to the new settlement of lpswich, Massachusetts, thirty miles north east of Boston, where he married a girl who also had arrived in that year, Hannah Pengry – they went on to have five children. Robert was an active member of town affairs; according to the Day Geneology website: 'He was made a freeman on May 6, 1635. He served on the lpswich petit jury in 1642, and on the Grand Jury from 1651. He became a Town Constable in 1660.'

While our knowledge of these Stanstead Abbotts' worthies is meagre, we nevertheless celebrate the fact that our village and its neighbours played its small role in making America 'great'!

#### PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

#### **Great Amwell Parish Council**

Previous articles have outlined various issues considered by the Parish Council and projects it is pursuing. One project that is nearing completion is the provision of new bus shelters (and a litter bin) along the A1170. The old wooden shelters at the Amwell Roundabout end of the A1170 (on both sides) have been replaced and two new shelters provided on the western and eastern sides outside Van Hages (the eastern shelter installed at the end of July). The Parish Council's new website has been completed: https://greatamwellparishcouncil.gov.uk.

Community Groups may already be aware of grant support opportunities provided by Stansted Airport through its Passenger Community Fund and its Community Fund:

- \* The Passenger Community Fund donates money to local causes within a 20-mile radius of the airport. Consideration is given to requests from sports clubs, pre-schools and nurseries, junior sports clubs, Brownies, Guides, clubs and other local charities. For further information and to request an application form, email: sandra\_king@stanstedairport.com.
- \* The Community Fund is dedicated to bringing lasting benefit to those areas most affected by the airport's operations. It forms part of the Airport's Community Engagement programme, committed to minimising the impact its operations have on surrounding communities, and offers grants to groups within an approximate 10-mile radius of the airport. A grant of up to £5,000 for tangible items of lasting benefit, such as equipment and furniture, may be available. Applications for operating costs, running costs, maintenance, venue hire, salaries or other consumables for a project will not be considered.

As the lowest tier of local government in Hertfordshire, the Parish Council has few statutory powers. Its focus is on representing local views to the principal authorities (Herts County Council and East Herts District Council) and Government agencies on various matters. Additionally, it aims to maintain the environmental wellbeing of the parish through activities such as litter picking etc. Please contact the District Council directly on issues such as litter picking, anti-social behaviour and refuse collection (www.eastherts.gov.uk/contactusform).

#### St Margarets Parish Council

The Ware & Stanstead Abbotts Safer Neighbourhood Team held the first 'Coffee with a Cop' session in the parish in May. The sessions are designed to give residents the opportunity to raise issues or concerns or to just get some advice on police matters. Further dates for future sessions will be announced shortly and posted on the Parish Council Facebook page and website.

We continue to liaise with the District/County Councils to sort flooding issues on Hoddesdon Road, St Margarets Road and Hailey Lane. The junction of Station Road/Lawrence Avenue has recently been reviewed and appropriate remedial works carried out. Interim repair works were carried out to the road surface on Hailey Lane and there will be further repairs made later in the year/early next year.

We continue to work towards improvements in the area and are finalising arrangements to deal with the graffiti on the A414 flyover pillars. We have also purchased a new noticeboard that will be located at the Nigel Copping Community Building on Hoddesdon Road and hope the addition of an extra noticeboard within the parish will help capture a wider audience. In addition, we are in the process of having a D-Day commemorative bench delivered and fitted at the busstop by St Mary the Virgin, St Margarets' Parish Church on Hoddesdon Road following a request from a resident.

#### **HERTSLYNX**

I had no idea that such a wonderful service existed until a friend mentioned it. Have you heard of HertsLynx? Since having to give up driving because of my deteriorating sight, I have been unable to visit a friend who lives in Royston. I live in Great Amwell and there is no bus route from near me that goes anywhere near Royston. A train line used to go to Buntingford, but that closed down long before we came to live in Great Amwell and that was some 37 years ago.

However, I made a telephone call and was advised to register and make use of Dial-a-Ride – especially if I needed to be taken to a hospital appointment, for instance. I had heard of Dial-a-Ride and certainly that service includes collection from my door step, but it does not go to Royston.

I carefully re-read the leaflet that had been given me and made a further telephone enquiry and was delighted to be told that I could indeed use the HertsLynx service to get to Royston. When did I want to travel? On a Friday in about a fortnight's time. What time of day to set off? About 10am, please. Do I realise I have to reach a proper departure point? Yes, the bus stop at St Margarets Station. Hold on please...the HertsLynx bus will be at the station bus stop at 9.45am on that date and will take you to Royston Bus Station arriving at 10.35am going via Buntingford. You are already registered with us? Do you have a Hertfordshire Senior Bus Pass? Yes. Bring it with you. How much will this trip cost? Nothing!

This service is available to anyone wishing to travel to and from villages and towns throughout Hertfordshire, except that Decorum has its own service and at the moment they do not interlink. People who wish to travel have to book, of course, and those without concessionary passes have to pay for their transport. Once registered, you can book online at hertslynx.co.uk or by phone to 01992 555513. I would recommend it!

#### FROM HARVEST TO PINT: THE LOCAL JOURNEY OF FRENCH & JUPPS BARLEY

One might be forgiven for thinking that the French & Jupps facility here at The Maltings is just like any other manufacturing site around the country. Lorries come and go, and the distinct glow of high visibility jackets can be seen being worn by team members on site; yet hidden behind The Maltings Business Centre sits a historic production facility that has been making fine roasted malts in the heart of Stanstead Abbotts for over 160 years. Little has changed over the centuries; our raw materials and manufacturing process remain all natural and, importantly, our raw materials are not sourced from faraway lands - they're grown right here on our doorstep within our local community.

So where does our barley grow? Well, chances are you will have seen it, as all the barley we use to create our speciality crystal and darker patent malts is grown within 50 miles of our maltings here in Stanstead Abbotts. Our closest agricultural partner is just a stone's throw from where you are possibly reading this article now, in Watton at Stone, Hertfordshire. Just weeks ago, the fields surrounding the area would have been rippling with golden waves of barley ready for harvesting.

Our malting process requires two simple ingredients: barley and water. We carefully combine them to mimic the natural conditions the barley seed experiences when sown in September, bringing the kernel to life. French & Jupps sources over 10,000 tonnes of local winter barley annually. While spring barley is more common in malting, we find winter varieties ideal for our small-batch roasting process. Importantly, winter barley benefits our farmers by allowing them to better manage their workload throughout the year, supporting oilseed rapeseed cultivation while still delivering strong yields.

Our process commences by 'steeping' the barley in water, and after 3 days, the barley moisture levels have risen dramatically and the kernel springs into life. Following a controlled germination phase, we then gently apply heat to preserve the kernel and its valuable starch content. The magic happens during the next steps, where we carefully apply heat and gently roast the grain in a rotating drum. Our skilled operators consistently take samples and use their

trained eyes to achieve the wide range of colour profiles desired by our customers. We produce 14 roasted malt types, ranging from pale golden Cara Malts to the powerful dark Chocolate and Black Malts, which bear a striking resemblance to the roasted coffee beans we enjoy at home.

Whilst harvest festivals may typically take place in September, for us, the barley harvest happens in July. This aligns perfectly with the maturity of our chosen winter barley and ensures the optimal crop moisture and maturity for harvesting. Throughout the seasons, we will visit our agricultural partners to regularly monitor the barley's progress, where the farmer's expertise is vital. For them, maintaining the right balance of fertiliser, controlling weeds and protecting the plants from disease are all essential for ensuring the barley's quality.

French & Jupps isn't just about producing exceptional roasted malts, we're committed to a sustainable brewing journey that begins right here in our community. Sourcing barley locally minimises our indirect emissions (Scope 3 footprint) while fostering strong relationships

with local partners, from farmers to esteemed brewing customers like Hertford's McMullen's Brewery. This close collaboration allows us to closely monitor crop health, ensuring a sustainable supply chain for our customers and

minimising waste throughout the process. We utilise every part of the grain: barley becomes malt, while any unsuitable grains extracted during our 'dressing process' are returned to the farms for animal feed, ultimately generating fertiliser that nourishes the next season's crop. This completes the circle, ensuring a sustainable future for our craft and our community from this harvest, to the next.

#### UPDATES FROM OUR LOCAL SCHOOLS



#### St Andrew's Church of England (VC) Primary School

It hardly seems believable that we have come to the end of another academic year. Our Year 6 children completed their SATS and our results are well above the National Average. We have done equally well in both our Year 1 Phonics Screening and our Year 4 Multiplication Test. Even more importantly we have continued to provide our children with a well-planned curriculum, covering all the subject areas, which has helped to develop and enrich their knowledge. We have ensured that, despite the more difficult economic climate, our children are still provided with a rich and varied assortment of visits and visitors, sporting and musical opportunities.

Trips in the summer term have included EYFS to Shepreth Wildlife Park, Year 1 to Capel Manor Farm, Year 2 have had a 'Great Fire of London' experience, Year 3 have investigated the Romans at Welwyn Museum, Year 4 have had a Greek Experience day, Year 5 had a trip around The Maltings, while Year 6 went on their residential trip to Wiltshire. Our excellent sporting provision has been recognised by the School's Mark team as we have been awarded our Platinum School Games Mark, which is the highest award we can achieve. #### **Ofsted Outstanding 2024**

Amwell View School and Specialist Sports College was rated Outstanding again by Ofsted in April 2024. Neil Ward, Headteacher said, 'We are extremely proud of the children and the school. As a staff group we remain dedicated and committed to continuing to develop the school and the learning opportunities we offer, so that our children have the very best education and opportunities that we can offer and that they deserve.'

The report states the following under 'What is it like to attend this school?':

This school opens up the world to its pupils. Pupils make astonishing progress because staff are highly skilled. They deliver expertly bespoke curriculums according to pupils' needs. Staff's aim is to 'unlock cognitive potential' and they do this through a variety of means. Developing pupils' ability to communicate is at the heart of the school's work. They do this with tangible success. Staff know pupils exceptionally well. There is no ceiling to the ambition they have for the pupils in their charge. During their time at school, pupils have many opportunities they may not ordinarily experience, such as rock climbing and horse riding. Some even develop the confidence to sing at the Royal Albert Hall. Post—16 students learn how to run the school's charity shop and garden for the local business community. There is a highly positive learning atmosphere at the school. Staff use of gentle humour, coupled with boundless enthusiasm, develops trust where pupils want to 'have a go'. #### ST JAMES' CHURCHYARD

As you drive along the Roydon Road, weaving round the tight bends, it is quite easy to miss the white sign that says Historic Church Open. If you are new to the village, you probably don't even realise that St James' Church is the old parish church for Stanstead Abbotts, or that it has been the place where generations of local people have been laid to rest for at least eight centuries. While the church itself is retired, and the Parish Church is now St Andrew's on Cappell Lane, the churchyard is still in use and a special place for many local families. It is a beautiful spot, a pausing point for footpath walkers, but most importantly a place where families can come to remember, and to seek some comfort and peace.





It's also a huge meadow filled with multiple obvious obstacles, ant skyscrapers, hidden curb stones and plenty that makes a quick mow impossible. Finding someone to do the job regularly and reliably has been painful and frustrating! The days when you could ask a few volunteers to pop round are long gone, although one parishioner remembers her Dad going out regularly to maintain St Margarets' Churchyard with his scythe!

The cost of maintaining the churchyard is carried by the congregation of St Andrew's, but has been generously supported over the years by many folk, regular donations, and some will remember the tenacious fundraising of Iris Lyon, who now rests in peace at St James.

So we have put together a plan that looks to both the long-term funding and sustainability. Strimming and mowing the churchyard takes two people approximately eight hours and it needs to be undertaken monthly during the summer months. The total cost at £15 per hour is £1,700 per year. Including machinery and maintenance costs, we need to raise approximately £2,500 a year. An income of £400 already comes from Grave Trust Funds: investments set up a number of years ago by individuals to provide a regular income to support the maintenance of particular graves in perpetuity. It is our intention to do a similar thing for the churchyard as a whole and so we have launched a Churchyard Fund Appeal to raise £40,000, which along with the existing trusts would give us a solid fund from which to draw an income of £1,800 a year to support the regular maintenance of our churchyard for the whole community. We have made great progress so far thanks to very generous donations from five local donors, and we have already raised nearly £20,000, but there's still another £20,000 to find.

Can you help? If St James' Churchyard is important to you (and from the many complaints we have had in our contractor struggles, I know it is) then please give generously! We now have a solid maintenance contract in place and the churchyard is looking great again, accessible and well maintained... please help us keep it that way!

#### RECIPE: CHEESE PINWHEELS

I give the basic version here, but this is a really easy recipe to adapt. You can personalise it by adding fresh mozzarella/spinach/pesto/sun-dried tomatoes/pepperoni/ham... really anything you like!

#### **INGREDIENTS**

1 x 325g sheet all-butter puff pastry 150g (5oz) fresh tomato pasta sauce 50g (2oz) cheese of your choice, grated 1 egg, beaten 15g (1/2 oz) parmesan, finely grated (optional)

#### **METHOD**

- 1. Preheat the oven to 200°C, Fan 180°C, Gas Mark 6.
- 2. Unroll the pastry sheet onto a baking sheet lined with non-stick baking paper and spread evenly with the tomato sauce, leaving a 1cm border.
- 3. Scatter with cheese (and, if you like, here's where you add your extras!). Kids will really enjoy doing this.
- 4. Taking one of the short ends, roll up the pastry as tightly as possible.
- 5. Chill in the fridge for 20 minutes or until firm to the touch.
- 6. Cut the roll into 12 equal slices and place on 2 baking sheets, well spaced.
- 7. Brush the tops with beaten egg and scatter over the parmesan (optional).
- 8. Bake for 15–20 minutes, or until puffed up and golden. Leave to cool for 5 minutes before serving.



#### BUSINESS SPOTLIGHT: BRUCE HANSING STUDIOS

Artist Bruce Hansing has lived for most of his life in Ware and for the last 15 years he has been working in a studio at Stanstead Bury producing scenery and props that form key parts of films and TV shows. There are various independent companies at Stanstead Bury, which is also a working farm, but Bruce is the only creative. He loves going to work there and thoroughly enjoys the rural scenery and ambience — even though sometimes delivery drivers and lorries that come to take away his splendid creations struggle to find him.

Bruce is not at all a conventional artist as he creates figures and objects from materials that include clay and fibre-glass, which can be seen in films, TV shows and theme parks. Outside his studio when I arrived to interview Bruce were a giant pumpkin as well as a very large bird or two. Bruce graduated with a First Class degree in Fine Arts from Cheltenham College of Art back in 1986. After that he became a sculptor and mould-maker whose work since 1987 can be seen in Robocop I and II, Batman and Robin Hood Prince of Thieves. Sometimes he would work on set and actors including Pierce Brosnan (007) and Jack Nicholson (the Joker) were around.

Bruce's career has included much travel and work abroad. He worked in the early 90s for Euro Disney creating artificial rockwork and other major props. After that he worked for Elstree Studios on Gladiators, Star Wars, Tomorrow Never Dies, Alien Resurrection and Lost in Space. At around this time Bruce developed a very keen

interest in the work of HR Giger who had created the monster for Alien. Bruce has become so expert at producing his own alien monsters that he has regular requests to produce them from the HR Giger Museum in Gruyere, Switzerland and for a themed Aliens discotheque in Basle.

When Bruce was working on Jurassic Park, he could see how much computers were going to be replacing the need for his props. That was when he changed course and worked more to provide theme parks that could not rely on computergenerated images, but needed the physical scenery. He enjoyed producing the Jaguar Shrine for the Jumanji ride at Chessington World of Adventure.

Bruce does have some opportunities to relax – he used to enjoy badminton in the village, but tends now to relax by the river at The Jolly Fisherman with friends. He finds the Co-op very handy for shopping. Like many of us, Bruce loves the

countryside feel of our village, but also the easy access to London on the train. When he is busy sculpting and moulding his fantasy animal creations the peace and quiet at Stanstead Bury is ideal for his concentration.


