

Great Amwell Parish Council

The project to provide four new bus shelters (two on both sides of the A1170 within the parish) has now been completed (in partnership with Hertfordshire County Council and Van Hage Garden Centre). The picture (right) shows the shelter opposite the garden centre.

The Parish Council has funds available to award community grants. If any organisation wishes to apply for grant support for a community project/event then please contact the authority to obtain an application form: clerk@greatamwellparishcouncil.gov.uk.

The Parish Council has few statutory powers. Its focus is on representing local views to the principal authorities (Herts County Council and East Herts District Council), particularly on development control matters (e.g. planning applications and instances where it considers a breach of planning control may have occurred). It is also the case that parishioners can make representations directly.

FREE HOME DECARBONISATION PLAN AND UP TO £3,000 IN GRANT FUNDING

For a limited time, East Herts Council is offering free home decarbonisation plans** worth £250, and access to further match funding to subsidise low carbon measures for your home.

A total of 50 plans are on offer on a first come first served basis from September 2024. Upon completion of a plan, further funding of up to £2,000 or £3,000 is available to put towards installation of solar panels or an air source heat pump, respectively.



If you have been considering installing solar or an air source heat pump and perhaps have existing plans or are saving towards installing them, this is a fantastic opportunity to make those plans a reality while understanding the full energy saving picture for your home.

THE LOCAL JOURNEY OF WINTER BARLEY

The English countryside, particularly in the East, is a tapestry of picturesque landscapes and fertile grain fields. Beyond their beauty, these fields are the heart of a thriving agricultural industry, producing some of the finest crops in the world. One such crop, essential to our daily lives, is winter barley.

Cultivating winter barley

Winter barley, as the name suggests, is cultivated through the winter months. It's a hardy grain that is typically 'drilled' in September and produces high-quality yields and robust husks, ideal for the malting process, prized by maltsters and

our brewing partners alike. British barley, in particular, is renowned globally, certified as AUKM (Assured UK Malt) by the Maltsters Association of Great Britain. For over 200 years, we have been sourcing and roasting barley to create a range of specialty malts used in the brewing process. Our commitment to local sourcing is unwavering; almost all the barley we use is grown within 30 miles of our maltings.

A local partnership: Great Munden Farm, Ware

This journey begins with our farmers. One such partner is Ben Pledger of Great Munden Farm in Ware, a family run farm since the 1950s. Ben has been the Farm Manager for over three years, bringing with him eight years of experience as an ergonomist at the farm. They produce approximately 800 tonnes of winter barley annually, in addition to a range of other crops, including wheat, oilseed rape, winter beans and spring barley.

The growing season: care and maintenance

Throughout the growing season, meticulous care is essential to ensure the crop's success. Ben tends to the barley, ensuring it receives the necessary nutrients and protection from pests and diseases. 'When drilling winter barley, we work at a rate of about 5 hectares an hour, completing an average field in approximately 2 hours,' he explains. 'That might sound fast, but the process doesn't stop at a single field; it's an early start to ensure all the winter barley is drilled in a single day across the farm.'

The timing is crucial. 'Winter barley must be sown in late September,' Ben emphasises. 'Delaying it into October can significantly reduce yields. The soil moisture needs to be

just right, not too wet or dry. Wind is also a critical factor, as we must apply weed spray before drilling. If it's too windy, we simply can't spray, as it will get blown away, so it's a delicate balance of all weather conditions.'

The seed must be drilled at the correct depth too, with a margin of only 8 millimetres to work with. Maintaining and calibrating equipment from field to field is crucial, as soil conditions can vary. 'We drill the barley into the soil at a depth of between 32 and 40 millimetres,' Ben explains. 'Any deviation can make a big difference! If it's too deep, the crop won't establish and grow. If it's too shallow, birds can peck it out, or the grain can come into contact with herbicide, damaging the crop.'

Through the winter to the harvest

Now that our barley has been drilled in, our partners at Great Munden Farm can take a breath. In the heart of winter, our barley, carefully drilled is steadily maturing. Although the work may not be over, this period between drilling and harvest is critical. Ben and the team will be meticulously monitoring the crop, assessing growth, pest control and soil health throughout the seasons to ensure healthy growth through the spring, and preparing our barley for our July harvest. This cycle of growth and renewal is a testament to the dedication and expertise of our local farmers over centuries. Their commitment to the quality of their crops is essential to the production of our hand-crafted malts from field to glass.

SPACE - Supporting neurodivergent families in Hertfordshire



Autism | ADHD Neurodiverse Conditions At SPACE, we are passionate about creating a supportive and inclusive community for neurodivergent children, young people and their families. Based in Hertfordshire, our charity is dedicated to empowering and supporting the parents and carers of children and young people with neurodiverse conditions like autism, ADHD and dyslexia, while also providing guidance and resources for the professionals who work with them. We currently support over 10,000 local families and work tirelessly to increase understanding, reduce isolation and build confidence, not only for neurodivergent children and young people, but for the wider community as well. We do this through a range of services including 1–1 family support, peer-based support groups,

training and workshops, over 30 different monthly events and activities for young people, and our Lending SPACE community hub and library.

Lending SPACE, located in the Maltings Business Centre in Stanstead Abbotts, is unique in Hertfordshire. It is a free service where families can borrow a wide range of sensory and practical resources designed to support neurodivergent children and young people. The items we provide can make a big difference in helping families find what works for their child without having to make an often expensive financial investment.

From sensory equipment, such as weighted blankets and fidget toys, to communication aids and calming tools, Lending SPACE is a treasure trove of resources that can help make life a little easier. Open Monday, Wednesday and Saturday mornings from 9:30–12:30 Lending SPACE is a lifeline for many local families who might otherwise struggle to find or afford these specialised resources, as well as for families who are looking for somewhere to stay and play where their family is welcome and accepted. For many parents, Lending SPACE offers more than a lending library and a safe space for their children – it provides a sense of community and connection. Parents and carers are able to meet others facing similar challenges, sharing experiences, advice and support. We regularly receive feedback from families who say how much they value the friendships and networks they've developed.

We are also proud to host a number of inclusive activities and events at many locations in Hertfordshire, including our popular Lego Club in Stanstead Abbotts. This club is much more than just an opportunity to build with Lego bricks — it's a chance for neurodivergent children to engage in a fun, creative and social environment while interacting with other children like them. The club is run by supportive staff who understand the needs of neurodivergent children, and the emphasis is on creating a relaxed and accepting environment where children can be themselves, make new friends, and build confidence and self-esteem.

At SPACE, we believe that every neurodivergent individual deserves to be understood, supported and celebrated, and enjoy partnering with other organisations who share a similar outlook. For example, we recently partnered with Captain Fantastic to pilot bespoke parties for children with special educational needs and disabilities with the aim of creating a fun and safe environment where every child can enjoy the magic of a party at their own pace and in their own way.

For the first time this year we organised a sponsored walk through the beautiful countryside surrounding our villages in partnership with another local charity Helping Herts. Over 35 people took part in either a fun family 5k or a circular half

marathon walk starting and ending in Stanstead Abbotts and we hope to have even more people walking with us in 2025!

NEW D-DAY COMMEMORATIVE BENCH IN ST MARGARETS

St Margarets' Parish Council received a request from a resident asking if they could provide a bench at the bus stop opposite St Mary's Church on Hoddesdon Road. They agreed that a bench would be useful for residents, so chose a commemorative bench to celebrate the 80th anniversary of the D-Day landings on 6 June 1944.

Permission was sought from the Bus Infrastructure and Network Infrastructure Team within the Highways Department at Hertfordshire County Council to place the bench in its location and it was purchased from David Ogilvie Engineering Ltd

who specialise in street and park furniture. It was part funded with a £500 Locality Budget Scheme Grant awarded by Cllr Jonathan Kaye at Hertfordshire County Council and the remainder paid for by the Parish Council. Local resident Matthew King of MK Independent Ltd kindly donated materials and installed the bench.

It is really very beautiful and will give residents a place to stop and rest, while also remembering the brave souls who fought for their country and gave their lives for others.

I am sure you will all agree that this bench is a lovely and poignant addition to the village. Thanks go to the resident who suggested it and to the Parish Council for taking up the request.

MEET A LOCAL: ROB AND LINDA GIFFORD

Rob and Linda first met as teenagers at a party in Theydon Bois, but 17 years ago they moved with their son and daughter from Old Nazeing Road to Stanstead Abbotts. They had often walked in the area and particularly wanted to live close to public transport so their then teenage children could travel about independently. They love the historical aspects of the village, the charm of many buildings and the friendliness of the residents who were welcoming from the moment they moved in. The house came with a shed that could be converted to a studio for Linda, plus a workshop for Rob and a suitable space upstairs for Rob to practise the drums.



Rob worked for BT and Linda was teaching art and design when they lived in Broxbourne — until the arrival of their children when unusually for that time Rob was the one who stayed at home, while Linda continued full-time teaching. Rob not only worked on his allotment, but he also studied English, Philosophy and Ecology in the evenings at this busy time. Rob's skills as a drummer led to an invitation to team-teach a drama class at Turnford College. It was a class for SEND students and Rob found that not only did he enjoy communicating with SEND students, but that his success in that role was noticed by other members of staff there who suggested more roles for him. Before long he was working there full-time teaching a variety of subjects including Citizenship, community music (which involved visiting day centres), coppicing (which meant taking students out to Broxbourne Woods) and wood turning after he had learned it himself from a colleague.

In 2000, Linda changed the course of her career from teaching to studying Business and Digital Skills at Hatfield University before becoming a full-time textile designer. There followed some years of exhibiting and selling at large craft fairs and exhibitions: items such as cushions, framed sections of designs, cards and pictures with manufacturing help from her sister, Maggie. Since retiring, she has continued in a more low-key way and many will have been to Linda's recent Open Studio, and many will have seen her stalls at other exhibitions such as the one at Courtyard Arts. Linda shows her work at the Visual Arts Exhibition at Living Crafts at Hatfield House, but she believes that what many people want now is the actual hands-on experience of making things rather than to purchase someone else's ready made products.

Rob also goes to Living Crafts where he demonstrates wood turning. Since the college was forced by government changes to stop providing training for SEND people after they had had 3 years' worth, Rob has joined a former colleague as a volunteer at Appleby Cottage. This is a smallholding run for the benefit of SEND young adults where Rob can continue his outdoor teaching and wood turning.

Rob has been able to synthesise many of his talents and skills in his voluntary work. He spends at least 4 hours a week at Ware Museum looking at what they have in store that relates to Stanstead Abbotts in particular. Oddly, Rob didn't especially enjoy history at school, but he has been on the committee of the Stanstead Abbotts Local History Society since it began a few years ago along with Linda. They are also both on the committee running the Stanstead Abbotts Concert Society – formerly Ceilidh Society – which meets monthly between October and July in the Parish Hall. Rob has played the drums since the age of 11 and he recalls with pride a reference to him in the Guardian as 'the benchmark of folk drumming'. He still plays drums and the guitar, and he particularly enjoys playing with daughter, Beth. Linda has been learning the violin and is very interested in the collections of folk songs by Cecil Sharp. She also sings with the Hertford Choral Society, which delights audiences in East Herts.

Rob loves to see the pleasure the SEND students get from learning and making things, especially the communication through music that can reach even the deaf students. Linda loves creating, working on something until it is absolutely right, especially if there have been problems to solve along the way. If they were to be giving a dinner party they would happily invite local friends and it might well include some musical entertainment. To sum up their personalities, Rob feels he has an enquiring mind and Linda would say she pursues colour, design and patterns. What they value most about the village is the friendly people.

RECIPE: STAINED GLASS BISCUITS

This is a really simple and magical biscuit recipe! It worked really well with my kids. They loved the transformation! Hang them on your tree to see the lights shine through.

INGREDIENTS

- 150g butter, softened
- 100g muscovado sugar
- 1 large egg
- 250g self-raising flour, plus extra for flouring
- 1 pinch of salt
- 1 tbsp mixed spice
- 1 tsp vanilla extract
- 1 pack boiled coloured sweets

METHOD

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180°C/Gas 4 and line a baking tray with grease-proof paper.
- 2. Whisk together the butter and sugar in a large bowl. Once lightened and creamy add the egg and mix thoroughly.
- 3. Sift in the flour then add salt, mixed spice and vanilla extract. Mix with a wooden spoon until you reach a biscuit dough consistency.
- 4. Turn the dough onto a floured work surface and roll out to about 1cm thick. Cut out biscuit shapes (such as stars or Christmas trees) and place onto the lined baking tray (you may need more than one tray, or to cook in batches).
- 5. Using a smaller cutter or a small knife cut out the centre of each biscuit. Place a boiled sweet into the hole (cut in half if your hole is very small) and place in the preheated oven to cook for 15 minutes, or until golden-brown and crisp with the sweet melted.
- 6. As soon as the biscuits are baked and while they are still warm, use a straw to poke a hole out of the top of each biscuit. Be careful not to make this hole too near the edge of the biscuit. Once the melted sweets have hardened, transfer to a wire rack to cool. Thread a length of string, ribbon or florist's wire through the hole and they are ready for hanging up.

THE STANSTEAD ABBOTTS AND ST MARGARETS NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN UPDATE



The Neighbourhood Plan, which has been put together by volunteers over the last six years, finally reached the pre-submission consultation stage otherwise known as Regulation 14. Responses received during the consultation period were considered and responded to, and in some cases led to adjustments being made. Three potential sites were removed leaving only the Netherfield Lane site and the Chapelfields garage sites. These were partly the result of changes to rules regarding flood zone 3 and partly as the Lea Valley Park were not entirely happy about the South Street site.

There are lists of community assets, green spaces and favourite views that need to be protected. There is much about conservation of both our heritage and the natural environment. There is a section on business, another on the riverside and another on transport.

The plan will shortly be submitted to East Herts Council following the go-ahead from the three parish councils involved. When the district council is satisfied that the Steering Group has met its obligations it will organise the Regulation 16 Consultation, which tests whether it meets the Basic Conditions and is in fact capable of becoming a legal document. Responses may again be made by residents.

Following this second formal consultation the draft plan will be looked at by a planning inspector. Once this inspector has approved the Plan the final stage will be the Referendum. All those on the electoral register who live within the designated area – that is the whole of St Margarets, Stanstead Abbotts and those parts of Great Amwell that are part of the main settlement area – will be able to vote in favour of adopting the plan or not in favour. If more than half of those who vote in the Referendum approve of the plan and it is consequently adopted, it would be extremely difficult for any development to occur before 2033 that is not set out in the plan.

The purpose of the Neighbourhood Plan is to protect the villages from more development than that 10% imposed on us by East Herts Council and to contain it, so that there won't be opportunities for developers to chip away at the green belt outside the settlement areas and create coalescence with neighbouring towns.

LOCAL HISTORIC FACES & PLACES: THE ATKINS

Now here's a nice story; the late Richard Atkins used to tell how one morning in 1888 his granddad, Sydney Herbert Atkins, set off from north London for a canter on his horse, but he came across a problem. Having arrived on his journey at the Stanstead Abbotts toll bridge over the River Lea, he found that he didn't have the cash (two copper coins) to pay the fee to cross. A passing villager coming upon Sydney's dilemma offered to pay the toll for him. This act of generosity so impressed Sydney that he decided he would like to set up home amid such gracious folk! This he did in the early 1890s and thus began the Atkins dynastic influence on our village's history. For instance, where would we be without our marvellous village pharmacy? Or, if you live in South Street, who built your home and when? And how about the various nurseries that kept the village going in vegetables and plants?

Sydney Atkins was in the fortunate position of being able to borrow from his father-in-law and with this capital he commenced a considerable building programme in what we now know as South Street. He opened a chemist's shop at the top of South Street in the early 1890s, which remains in the same location today under alternative management and ownership. Very interestingly, apart from being a chemist, Mr Sidney Atkins also supplied household coal and probably coke from his back yard, as well as running a small market garden of sorts on the land behind the shop.

Even more significantly, just after 1900, he built a row of terraced houses on the right-hand side of South Street (numbers 1 to 33). Because of their quality build they were considered by residents of the Street to be superior to those older terraced houses on the opposite side of the road! (And, incidentally, you can still see along these houses the sight of the former lock-up that was used to 'host' rowdy tourists who'd drunk too much while crowding the river banks at holiday times!)

The Atkins houses were, when built, connected to the sewer but in 1938 when piped water was brought to the village only one cold tap over the kitchen sink was provided. This meant the outside toilets required a bucket full of water to flush the pan usually acquired from the outside hand pump rather than the new tap.

Mr Sidney Atkins was involved at various points with other enterprises in the area, notably with the St Margarets' Gas Company in Amwell Lane. Additionally, the extended Atkins family also branched out into the nursery trade and there are still signs of that enterprise in Marsh Lane together with the family house.


One sad note to conclude on: the family, like many others, sent off their young men to the First World War. One of them, Alfred 'Cecil' Atkins, lost his life at the age of 19 and is buried in a War Grave at Rouen. His death is commemorated by a plaque in St Andrew's Church.

BOOKS ABOUT THE NEW RIVER



The Stanstead Abbotts Local History Society (SALHS) recently heard a talk by the former BBC Journalist, Nick Higham, based on his new book The Mercenary River: Private Greed, Public Good: A History of London's Water (published by Headline in 2022). Nick noted in his talk that the New River was neither new, nor a river, but it is still functioning more than 400 years after it was first opened in 1613. The purpose of the river, which is really a canal, was to bring water from the Amwell and Chadwell Springs in Hertfordshire (it now comes mainly from the River Lea) to meet the needs of the capital.





The scheme was masterminded by Hugh Myddleton, statues of whom can be found at Islington Green and elsewhere. Myddleton established the New River Company, which was probably the first permanent joint stock company. He persuaded King James I to become a 50% shareholder, which helped to prevent landowners from complaining about the loss of their land. Charles I later sold the shares back to Myddleton, which was a big mistake as the New River Company turned out to be one of the most profitable companies in British history. Robert Mylne and his son William Chadwell Mylne were Chief Engineers for the New River for 97 years between them.

Demand for water continued to increase in London and further pumping stations, initially powered by steam and later by diesel power, were built to accommodate the need. Other water companies sprung up but none were as successful as the New River Company. In 1854, Dr John

Snow, a pioneering anaesthetist and epidemiologist, was able to pinpoint the origin of cholera to the handle of a water pump in Soho. After this date, companies taking their water from the Thames were forced to move their intakes upstream from the city and clean and purify the water. In 1903 the Metropolitan Water Board was established and took over the powers of the New River Company. In 1974 control passed to the Thames Water Authority, which was subsequently re-privatised in 1989 as Thames Water. Today it is possible to follow a 28-mile walking path alongside the river to its original conclusion in Islington. Nick's book is very informative and fills in many gaps in our knowledge of the New River. It is available to purchase from Amazon and other booksellers including Waterstones.







Those who would like to know even more about the New River may wish to consult London's New River in Maps, the first volume of which was published by Michael F. Kensey in 2012 (in two parts). It is the first in a planned series of three or four volumes, and an excellent source of reference for anyone intending to research the history of the New River, or today walk and explore its present or earlier courses. This volume was a labour of love by its author and goes into great detail about the history of the New River. It contains a plethora of attractive photographs and maps tracing every aspect of the building and development of the New River.
